JUDGE SMART'S MOTHER DEAD

MRS. EUPHEMIA SMART, 89 YEARS OLD, LIVED HERE.

She Is Survived by Eight Children, Two of Whom Live in Kansas— Burial at Edgerton, Wis.

Mrs. Euphemia Smart, mother of District Judge C. A. Smart of this city, died at noon yesterday at her son's home, 463 Mulberry street, after an illness of three days. Complications incident to advanced age caused her death.

The funeral was held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Smart home. The Rev. Dr. W. A. Powell of the Federated Church conducted services and the body was sent to Edgerton, Wis., for burial. The pallbearers today were Charles A. and James H. Smart, Ralph E. Page and J. E. Elwell.

Mrs. Smart was very well known in Ottawa where she had made her home for fifteen years. She was born November 18, 1825, in Fifeshire, Scotland. Her husband, Robert Smart, died here twelve years ago. Mrs. Smart was a member of the Methodist church.
